
## **Brown Family and Reunion**

Benjamin Brown and Leticia (Tish) Horne Brown are my great grandparents. They moved to Pacolet Mills in about 1908 and lived there the rest of their life. This family picture was probably taken in the 1930s at the house on Green Street in Pacolet Mills. It includes some of Tish's sisters and her brother. Starting from the left, Ben Brown. He is carrying a cane because in his later years he was severely afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis. In the last few years of his life he was almost totally bedridden. Next is Annie Horne Lackey, a sister. Next, in the back is a daughter of Ben and Tisha, Mattie Brown Fowler. She is my grandmother and married Tillman Fowler. In the middle, in the front is Leticia Brown. Directly behind her is her brother, Archie Horne. Next to him is Lillie Horne Griffen, another sister. On the extreme right is also a sister, Effie Horne Little.

Annie, Archie, Lillie and Effie did not raise their families in Pacolet Mills.

## **One Big Family**

When I was growing up, I frequently heard that the people living in the Upstate textile towns were like one big family. One thing I have learned working on the Pacolet and Glendale websites is that they seem like this because they ARE one big family. It appears that almost everyone is related by either blood or marriage. The towns are a complex network of cousins and "cousins in law". Granny Brown's family is an example of that.

I was reminded of that a few years ago when I was contacted by a lady named Cindy Pruitt Jones. She lives in NC but her Dad and his family grew up in Glendale, SC. She had some photos and a write up about her Dad and wanted to know if we would like the information to go on the Glendale website. Her Dad was the late, Harold "Buddy" Pruitt. My wife, Mary, grew up in Glendale with Buddy and he was one of her childhood boyfriends.

Cindy sent me the information and I was getting it ready to go on the website. I noticed that Buddy's grandmother was Susan Horn Pruitt. Since my maternal great grandmother, Leticia Brown's maiden name was also Horn(e). I looked it up in my family records and lo and behold, Susan and Leticia were sisters. Susan's family settled in Glendale and Granny Brown's settled in Pacolet. Cindy and I are cousins as our great grandmothers were sisters. Back in the day, my Granny Brown had been Buddy's great aunt. Marion Benjamin Brown died at 2:30 o'clock Saturday, Oct. 23, 1943, at the residence in Pacolet Mills, SC following a lengthy illness. Native of Spartanburg County, SC and was born on July 17, 1861. He was a resident of Pacolet Mills, SC for the past 25 years and was a member of the Pacolet Mills Baptist Church. Survivors included: his wife, Mrs. Mae Tecia Brown; six daughters, Mrs. B. M. Bake, Mrs. Mattie Foster, Mrs. Blanche Arnold, Miss Clara Brown and Mrs. Marcus Bales, and Mrs. Jessie Paige; three sons, the Rev. W. T. Brown, Boyd and Victor Brown; 27 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. He was 82 years of age at his demise and interment was in the White Rose Cemetery.
